

Which Students Do We Serve?

What Services are Provided?

- Research Based Programs designed for students having school adjustment issues, stress, excessive shyness, playground or friendship issues or are dealing with a recent divorce, death in the family, anxiety, etc.
- Parent/teacher meetings with Rainbow staff when needed
- Building a community through books and classroom/playground interventions

PIP Program (Primary Intervention Program)

- ☐ 1 to 1 sessions for grades TK-5 with trained "special friend" paraprofessional
- ☐ 30 minutes/week in Rainbow Room nondirective play for 12 weeks
- Over 35 years of research in SRVUSD and previously statewide, proving its effectiveness

Second Step

- □ Social skills groups of 2 or 4 students, meet weekly for 12 weeks
- ☐ 45 minutes per week in Rainbow Room - structured social skills lesson then supervised free choice play time to practice the new skills
- Units on Empathy, Problem Solving, Emotion Management, and Skills for Learning

Friendship & Leadership Groups: Pals & Steps to Respect

- □ Small friendship groups of 2 to 4 students that meet weekly for 10 16 weeks
- □ 45 minutes per week in Rainbow Room - literature based lessons on friendship, assertiveness, antibullying, and diversity followed by free choice play time to practice their new skills

Get Ready for Middle School

Literature based program for 2 to 4 students (or push into classroom) for 2nd semester 5th graders - 10 weeks

□ 30 minute sessions where skills for coping with the challenges of middle school are read and discussed


Q & A session follows discussion

Steps to Get a Child in Rainbow


- Quick Referral Process allows children to start immediately after being referred.
- ✓ Timely response allows for interventions to begin before the problem continues to escalate.




Statewide EMHI Data Target Versus Comparison Group Percentile Scores

Statewide Evaluation Findings (through EMHI funding)

1999-2000

 No additional services were recommended for over 80 percent of EMHI participants at program exit.

 About 80 percent of participants showed improvement on the Walker-McConnell Scale each year.

Rainbow Program Benefits

Principals, teachers, and parents report the following improvements:

- ·Reduced bullying and teasing
- ·Students become more confident and assertive and are happier coming to school
- ·More positive overall school climate
- ·Fewer discipline referrals

Rainbow Program Summary

- 4 1986 EMHI/Rainbow program began in SRVUSD at Bollinger Canyon with PIP
- 4 2001 Second Step groups piloted at Twin Creeks
- 2009 Steps to Respect groups, playground interventions and building a community through books added to Rainbow Program
- 4 2014 Pals Friendship groups added at all schools
- 2020-Get Ready for Middle School program implemented
- 2020-2021: Over 1,200 students in SRVUSD participated in the Rainbow Program, with hundreds more receiving increased playground supervision and classroom literature based lessons on cultural diversity, friendship & anti-bullying
- 4 Through the "ripple effect" all students benefit.
